

THE OBJECTIVES OF THE **FEDERATION**


ENVIRONMENTAL

The Federation's Constitution lists the objectives of the Federation which impose constraints and discipline, and also provide incentives to innovate. Members are national organisations of professionals in state, regional or local government or private employment whose concern is the control of the environment in the interest of public health. The main objectives are to provide a focal point for and means of exchanging information about environmental health matters, systems of organisation and management, to promote the study of environmental sciences and exchange information about training, education and field studies. This is undertaken in cooperation with other organisations related to environmental health and also by promoting the interchange of persons engaged in environmental health work

REGIONAL GROUPS

A major reason for the establishment of the Federation was the recognition that environmental health problems can be transboundary issues. There are local problems, and, as we are increasingly aware, there are global problems, and there are regional problems.

The regional groups exist so that Member organisations can work with neighbouring Members; increasingly, the Regional groups are involving the Associated Bodies within their area. The Regional Groups, becoming more and more important, report their deliberations to the Federation through the Council.

THE FEDERATION AS AN INTERNATIONAL ORGANISATION

As an international organisation the Federation has needed to appear to be internationally driven. While, for good reasons, the organisation's administrative base is mainly located in the British Isles there have been fundamental changes. Currently the Federation's President is a Malaysian and its Chairman of Council is Swedish. The Federation has endorsed a number of World Congresses on Environmental Health which have been held in Australia, England, and Malaysia, a fourth such Congress will be in Aberdeen in 1996 and that will be followed by others in Stockholm (1998) Oslo (2000), and in California (2002).


Council meetings are now regularly assigned to member countries as are Presidential consultations. This process will continue.


POLICY STATEMENT NO. 2

On May 24, 1991, the Federation's Council approved the proposal of the Swedish Environmental Health Officers Association which is as follows:

"Every Member organisation and Associated Body should:

- (a) Adopt a programme of action to encourage a central role for the public sector in the co-ordination of environmental policies in each member country.
- (b) Ensure that the programme of action lays down the standards to be achieved and a time scale for their achievement.
- (c) Maintain pressure to ensure that environmental policies are continuously monitored and reviewed as appropriate.
- (d) Ensure that policies affecting the environmental health have regard to best practical means.
- (e) Attempt to co-ordinate locally, policies on the environment which have an international context.
- (f) Undertake research into environmental conditions in their local sphere of operation.
- (g) Work towards increasing public sector supervision of processes affecting the environment.
- (h) Co-operate with other Members and Associated Bodies of the Federation to assist in achieving these goals."





POLICY STATEMENT NO. 3

The Federation Council, on 15th May 1993, approved the proposition of the California Environmental Health Association as follows:

- (a) The International Federation of Environmental Health (IFEH) is an association comprising national environmental health associations from around the globe, and serves to foster and encourage environmental health education and communication.
- (b) IFEH supports measures that work to improve environmental conditions throughout the world and opposes any measure that may have a detrimental effect on the environment or health in any country. It recognises the economic importance of international trade such as the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), but neither specifically supports or opposes them.
- (c) IFEH resolves to encourage its member organisations to acquaint themselves with possible environmental and public health ramifications of international trade agreements.
- (d) IFEH further encourages the leadership of national environmental health associations to contact their individual government leaders to request consideration of both environmental and public health ramifications of any international agreement prior to ratification.


